THE IMPEACHMENT.

We have watched with a very consid erable interest the various aspects of this question as the circumstances have de veloped them - the more especially as it was the first time in our national history that the application of the law had been attempted upon our chief officer. The charges were formidable and the nation had a right to expect that before this time, an expose would be made which should either substantiate these charges or else declare that they were made un der a misapprehension. But the Con gress adjourned without any definite report, further than that they recommend the pursuit of the inquiry into its propriety, asserting that enough had already been brought to light to justify it .-What the impeachment committee have found, it seems to us amounts to about this. That the President has been guilty of usurping the power of Congress in dic taing terms of reconstruction to the southern people, but as they were not valid without Congressional action, it will be difficult to show that he has violated the law in simply going beyond his powers. If he made that action final, as he was disposed to do in the beginning there might be fair ground for his conviction, but as the whole matter is referred to Congress for ultimate action, it is doubtful if a postitive case could be made out against him. They have demostrated that he was an obstruction in the way of harmonizing the country, but while differing entirely with him in opinion, yet Mr. Johnson has the same right to what he says are his opinions as anybody else, and as long as he confines himself to legitimate attempts to carry out his opin ions we cannot see that he can be made the subject of a judicial conviction for this. They show that he has not carried out in its fulness the Civil Rights bill, and here in connection with the New Orleans massacre, and similar attrocities the indictment may possibly be found. for whether he approves or not, his business is to execute the laws as he finds them. It is possible, however, even here the blame may be laid at the door of incorrect information, or else upon some subordinate, and here again the prosecution fails. The committee show also that he has corruptly used the appointing power in selling the offices for large consider ations of money which was to be distrib uted among his friends-one at least of whom is a woman, whose reputation is of doubtful cast. The evidence upon this point is clear and positive, and unless controverted, will make a strong case. -It is also stated, though we have not read the evidence, that the same course has been pursued in granting pardons, and if so will make this point of the case a strong one Still, we do not much believe that anything will be done. Cononess as yet refuses to take any active stens in the matter, and in the meantime Mr. Johnson's term is running on towards its close in 1869. If no report were forthcoming before the close of the session, and the next one were consumed in trying the case, the term would expire about the same time as the trial and the whole matter be a most ridiculous farce. Policy is a most controlling element in the doings of politicians, and if the party now in the ascendant can continue Mr. Johnson in power and at the same time accomplish their own legislation, it will certainly do much toward the perpetuity of that power and so in our opinion the impeachment question will simply be used to show where the Presidenthas been wrong and bad, and thus unite the people against his policy, and then leave the

question without further action.

The figures of the Secretary of treasury show that since the corresponding period of 1865 the debt has been reduced over \$200,000,000. These are cheering figures, and if the process were continued for about fifteen years the United States would not owe a dollar. But the people seem to be unwilling that the process shall go on so rapidly, and the new tax bill exempts many articles from taxation. and lessens it in reference to others, so that the reduction will not likely be so great this coming year as in the two years last past. We are free to say that we think this is right. While we would rejoice to behold our industry relieved from the burden of the debt which presses so heavily upon it, stili we do not feel that we are best protecting those interests by compelling the payment of the debt too rapidly. The country is in the condition of a mortgaged farm. The property is worth eight times the mortgage, and larger payments could be squeezed out each year than is now paid. but if this is done there will not be the necessary money for fencing and manures and consequently the farm will be less productive and in the end the payment of the debt be put farther away. We must leave, at any cost of time, sufficient funds to the country to enable its industries to make money, or else the power to pay the indebtedness will be indefinitely deferred. In 1865 it contained 26,233, divided as follows: Bridge-Deerfield, 1,582; Fairfield, 2,679; Greenwich, 1,212; Hopewell, 1,752, Landis, 3,050; Maurice River, 2,393; Millville. 4,123; Stoe Creek, 1,137. Of these there were 9,038 white males, 9,136 white fe males, 466 colored males, 482 colored females, native born. Of foreigners, there were 354 white males, 297 white females, 47 colored males, 53 colored females. There were also 3.125 white males and 2.913 white female children between the ages of five and sixteen years; 184 colored male and 134 colored female chil-

dren between the same ages. These figures show that the increase of population has been gradually and steadily advancing, and those at all acquainted with our local characteristics are also aware that business, industry and Improvements have advanced in proportionate ratio. More than five time the number of manufactories, of various descriptions, are now in successful operation, than there were in 1830, and every other distinguishable feature of life and energy is seen at work throughout the county. The greatest increase and the most active development have occured since railroad communication was furnished our citizens with the city and other points in the county. Millville, Vineland and our own rapidly thriving and business city of Bridgeton, are ample evidences of this assertion.


