THE LITTLE WANDERERS.

Among the many forms in which the beneficent spirit of Christianity has developed itself in the last few years, there is probably none which impresses the outside world more with the value of that spirit than the efforts which are made to extend a kind and fostering care over those toward whom either nature or the misconduct of their natural protectors have deprived of the necessary oversight. Generous hearted men and women, moved by the misery which they beheld and prompted by the desire to rescue the little ones from the enthralments of vice before the chains of habit and disgrace were inevitably fastened around them, have formed themselves into societiesdonated their own money-solicited contributions from others--provided suitable buildings for the shelter of these waifs and estrays of humanity-purchased food for their sustenance -taught them the luxury of cleanliness through the free use of water-combed and apparelled them-taught them the rudiments of common school learning and singing-impressed them with the value of morality and religion-and finally procured for them homes in families where their chances for becoming valuable members of community were equal to those of their more fortunate compeers in the race of life. The Five Points Mission in New York has in this way rescued thousands from the certainty of becoming thieves, drunkards and infamous women, and added them to the moral forces of the land. The Bedford Street Mission in Philadelphia has accomplished, though in a lesser degree, the same result .-The Mission School in Bridgeton tends in the same direction, and all over the land the Divine spirit of religion is evoking in this direction the generosity of the people, both that portion who openly profess religion and those who, while not openly attached to any particular denomination, yet attempt largey to govern their lives by its moralities.

One of these homes in Philadelphia, pre

sided over by Rev. Mr. Kelsav, is called the "Little Wanderers' Home." On Thursday evening of last week a number of its inmates, under the care of Mr. Kelsay, paid Bridgeton a visit, and were met in Grosscup's Hall by an audience so densely packed as to compel a large number of our citizens to go away without having obtained admission. An address was made by Mr. Kelsay, from which it appeared that their "Home" is located in the building for receiving them. Several different and genial nature have procured him so many friends in his brief visits to our city. The children they receive are divided into four classes, the first of which comprises those trol of the institution for the purpose of being placed in Christian homes. A second class who are simply received into 'the school and given a daily bath and good dinner, but who return to their homes at night. There is still another class whose mothers are poor and industrious, and who leave them at the Home through the day while they are absent at the daily labors upon which they depend for their bread; and a last class whose mothers are in prison, together with those who are found in the streets without any home and brought in by the police or other responsible parties .-The institution depends entirely upon voluntary donations for its support, and although its managers have often been driven to their wits end for means yet the providence of God has never failed them, and there has always been means to enable them to prosecute their noble work. As usual the largest interest in this work is taken by the ladies, whose quick sympathies so soon recognize suffering in plans for its alleviation, and so far as human agencies are concerned it is probably owing to their indomitable cooperation that the institution has been attended with such remarkable success. 


