Troubles Among the Department Commanders.

The excessively foolish decision of the Attorney General of the United States is producing its natural fruits. Gen. Sickles, one of the most trusted servants of the United States, one of the most conciliating among all the executors of the congressional will in reference to the South, has already asked to be removed in consequence of this, and has demanded a court of inquiry into his official conduct.

THE SUBTERRANEAN CASE.

The trial of this notorious criminal is still proceeding in Washington, though without the excitement to the country which would have attended it eighteen months ago. The evidence almost entirely turns upon the question of identity. Strong proof is advanced to show that he was in Washington at the time of the assassination, and connected with Booth upon the very day of the murder, and he has been identified in this regard by different persons. The proof seems clear also that he escaped to Canada, in disguise, on the very next day.

THE MILITARY COMMANDERS.

The reconstruction bill, passed by Congress and which gave large duties and powers to the generals selected for the different districts, appears at last to be in danger of temporary obstruction. The language of Congress in the bill does not in all respects appear to be so clear as to set at rest all technical doubts as to the extent of the powers conferred and demanded by it.
