SHERIDAN'S REMOVAL.

This event, long looked for in official circles, has come at last. The bold and gallant hero of Winchester has been deemed incompetent to command the people of the extreme south-west, and so has been officially removed. In our judgment this is a great mistake, for Sheridan removed none but bad men and appointed none but good ones. That he was prompt and decisive is true, but it was precisely these qualifications that won success in the command of the army and it is precisely these qualities that have ensured success in his administration in the worst sections of the most rebellious states of the country. Gen. Sheridan has been transferred to the department of Kansas and Missouri, a position where there will probably be but little to do, and which is no doubt intended to be but nominal, although we shall be unfeeling to find something to do in unmasking rebels even there. There is one relieving feature to this removal, which is found in the substitution of Gen. Thomas, the victor of Chickahominy, for "Little Phil." Gen. Thomas will not be a much better friend to outlaws and misrule than was his predecessor, and any hopes which the disloyal element may build upon him will be doomed to disappointment. Altogether we look upon this action of the President as an unwise one, for the removal of Sheridan will but intensify the opposition to the policy of the administration, while the appointment of Thomas will in no wise further the ideas it is intended to promote.

CUMBERLAND CO. ALMS HOUSE.

This is one of the public "institutions" creditable to our county. The building is large and handsome, and very conveniently arranged, and we are informed by those who should know, that it is kept in good order by the present worthy incumbent, Mr. Seelye Shute. The inmates are nearly all aged persons. The youngest male being sixty-two, and the youngest female eighty-one. The oldest male is eighty-seven and the oldest female ninety-six. The average age of the males is seventy-four, and of the females eighty-four. The aggregate ages of eighteen males is 1543 years, and the aggregate ages of five females is 420 years. By the above statement it will be seen that most of the inmates are very old. We doubt if any other county house in this state can produce so many aged persons and so few in youthful or middle life. It can truly be said of those who inhabit the Cumberland county Alms House "the poor have the gospel preached unto them." Public services are held there every two or three weeks at the expense of the county, which is a good arrangement.

VINELAND RAILROAD.

The projected Railroad between Vineland and New York begins to look more and more like a success, and the probabilities are that it will be built within a year. When built, it will run directly to Bridgeton, and thus open up another avenue of communication with this section of country. This movement will obviate all difficulty in reference to the inconvenience of going from Vineland to Bridgeton for county purposes, and thus relieve the apparent necessity for a new county seat at Vineland. Our men of business will do well to interest themselves in this matter, for the road, if once in operation, becomes a necessity for us that it should not stop short of Bridgeton, and our men of means will secure ample remuneration by encouraging the enterprise.

THE SMALL-POX!

False reports continue to be circulated in reference to the extent of the small-pox in this city. The assertion that there were thirty cases here last week, is not only false, but perfectly absurd.—There has not been that many cases since the last six months, and not half a dozen deaths have occurred from it in this city within the past year. The few cases of varioloid, which occurred here within the past few weeks have been cured by our skillful physicians, and there is not the slightest danger in visiting Bridgeton. The false reports referred to above, were evidently circulated for the purpose of injuring the trade of our merchants.
