

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE. The annual Message of President Johnson, of which we printed the most important portions last week, is now before the country for its consideration. The people were intensely anxious to hear what Mr. Johnson had to say to Congress, the more especially as the majority report of the impeachment committee, appointed by that body, had reported in favor of the project. The Message opens with a lamentation that the country is not reconstructed. and insists in passionate and repulsive forms that the fault is altogether with the Congress. He argues the case at considerable length, but as the arguments have been so often discussed in these columns, it is scarcely worth while to recapitulate them here. He assumes that the acts of Congress are unconstitutional; that the these negro governments; that the courts in that section are all disposed to do perfect justice to the colored man; and that the States. upon the cessation of the rebellion, were at once entitled to their old position in the Union. All these ideas might pass without much comment, were it not for the fact that he coolly assumes first, that the action of Congress is unconstitutional, and then as coolly discusses the question whether it will not become the duty of the President to resist their action by FORCE. 


