PORT NORRIS.

Among the towns which are destined at no very distant day to take position among the there inside of an hour. communities of our section, is Port Norris. With many natural advantages, its place in the past has been somewhat of an isolated one. growing out of the fact that their advantages were not as yet in circumstances of development. Mauricetown and Cedarville were a little nearer to a market and as a consequence grew more rapidly, for the inexorable law of population has long since been definitely settled in favor of people congregating most where there was the readiest means to dispose of their surplus products; still, the question of advance was only a question of time. There was an immense oyster trade, of which Port Norris formed the natural centre.

So far this trade has been prosecuted under circumstances that prevented its easy development. It was an expensive as well as slow method of getting them to market in Philadelphia, by means of the river, and in addition to this in the dead of the winter, at which time they were most remunerative, the river was frozen and it was impossible to get them there at all. There was no other way to reach a market except by carting them for long dis_ tances over had roads to either Millville or Bridgeton, from whence they could be shipped in cars, and in most cases this was the general method.

In this ovster trade of Maurice River Cove. there are over two hundred boats engaged in planitng alone. These oysters are taken up and marketed yearly. The boats which market them make about eight trips to Philadelphia for this purpose, and carry probably an average of twenty tons. This would give thirty-two thousand tons of freight in this article alone, and if but half of this went by rail it would give a revenue to the road, at four cents per ton per mile of thirty-eight thousand and four hundred dollars. But the probability is that a far larger amount than this would go by rail, and it is also probable that with Railroad facilities the amount of the entire trade would be very much increased. As it is they go generally by this mode of conveyance from Millville or Bridgeton. On every day that the soft roads will bear the teams, large numbers of wagons may be seen lining the road, each loaded with all the oysters they could carry. A friend, from whom many of these statistics are obtained, passed seventeen wagons thus loaded, on the road from Dividing Creek to Bridgeton. An account kept of the number thus marketed from Port Norris in one single day of last winter, showed one hundred and upon their lines and in this way in the end be to shore, there is, for a little time, quite an sixty thousand oysters. These estimates of the oyster trade alone, show how almost essential it is to the prosperity of the entire county that the enterprise should be a success. But this is not all; there is a large reflex trade also, astonishment at the way in which our news recommences; all the anxiety being transferred which is now performed at a heavy cost. COMMUTATION.

Among the inducements presented by the West Jersey consolidated companies to people from Philadelphia, to secure residences along their routs, is the principle of commuting the fares to actual residents of the towns which dot the roads. This is a liberal and enlightened policy and insures both to the profit of the road and the people. We do not believe the corporation loses anything by lower fares, as the people travel so much more when it can be done for a less outlay, and in the end we believe the companies gain by the process of selling a large number of tickets at a smaller individual price, because the people have them in their pockets and use them so much the oftener. The regular fares on the road are light when all the circumstances are taken into consideration, and the commutation system proposes to make them lighter still. The plan proposed is new to us, but strikes us as eminently sensible and practical. A book is issued to a person containing one hundred tickets, good for the use of that particular individual, one of these tickets are torn from the book at each trip by the conductor and taken up, and so on till the number is exhausted, when a new book can be purchased. Laws of New Jersey.

CHAPTER ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT—An act to facilitate the drainage of swamp and meadow lands in the township of Landis, in the county of Cumberland, and in the township of Buena Vista, in the county of Atlantic.

Whereas, the interests of a large number of persons residing in the township of Landis, in the county of Cumberland, and in the township of Buena Vista, in the county of Atlantic, would be greatly promoted by the draining of large tracts of swamp and meadow land along certain streams; and whereas, the frequent overflowing of said swamp and meadow lands materially interferes with the cultivation of the same, and the construction. maintenance and use of certain highways of travel thereon for the accommodation of the people; therefore,

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey; That the overseers of the highways in the township of Landis, in the county of Cumberland, and in the township of Buena, Vista, in the county of Atlantic, are hereby authorized and required to ditch and drain theswamp and low lands in their respective districts in the said sownships where such ditching and draining shall seem to them necessary, and at all times to keep such ditches free and open for the proper drainage and improvement of the lands of said townships.

2. And he it enacted, That after the draining of any lands shall have been completed, it shall be lawful for the said overseers of the highways, and they are hereby required to assess, in their respective districts, upon the lands so drained, the price and expenses of draining them, and collect the same annually; provided however, that if any of said overseers of the highway shall fail to keep any portion of said lands in the jdistrict properly drained, he shall not collect or cause to be collected any tax upon such portion of said lands in the year or years when such failure shall happen.




