



NEW JERSEY FABM LANDS .- The annual report of the State Agricultural College, with lectures by Prof Cook, contains some interesting statisties. The value of our farm lands per acre, in 1860, was \$60 40, which is largein excess of similar lands in the surround following resolutions which were unanimously area in square miles. Monmouth stands next the cash value of her farms, but her area is but little more than half of that of Burling ton. The average value per acre of the land of Hudson county is \$581—the highest in the State. Essex stands next, being worth \$106 per acre. Bergen stands next, and Mercer ext. Of this, 1.944,441 acres is in im proved farms, and 1,039,084 acres unimproved There are also 309,328 acres of meadow and marsh lands, the improvement of which is strongly recommended.




