POLITICAL EXPENSES. Now that the two great parties of the State have settled upon their candidates and policy, it is likely that a great deal of money will soon be afloat. It is usually believed that all this means corruption, and undoubtedly s great deal of it does mean chicanery and fraud, and yet by far the greater part of the money spent is used for legitimate purposes, such as minded man. Some votes are directly bought, and in this case there is a direct orime, and one which we should like to see punished by the triple incarceration in the penetentiary of the voter who was bought, the agent who bought him, and the candidate who authorized the purchase. This would accomodate them all with State attentions, though not probably with the exact kind they contemplated at the beginning. Men are employed to speak in public, and if men give their time and talent to this purpose, it is right that they should be properly compensated. FLOOD IN BALTIMORE!! One of the most terrible freshets which has ever ccurred upon our Eastern States, occurred in th vicinity of Baltimore, on Thursday of last week The water suddenly rose ten feet higher than it had ever been known to do before, and swept away bridges, cuiverts, mills, houses, and property of every lescription, to the amount of at least from six to ten millions. The loss of life was also very great; certainly not less than from forty to sixty people were locmed, and possibly the loss may be much greater. The trains on the Railroads are very much embarrassed, from the destruction of the bridges, but will soon be running with accustomed regularity. Elli had recently taken the name of a city, was almost entirely destroyed. Large numbers of people are thrown out of employment, and left homeles pesides. The distress arising from this disaster is appalling, and appeals for aid will no doubt soon be resented to the people. Additional particulars of the flood in Maryland state that six persons are drowned, or missing, in Baltimore, and thirty-seven in Ellicott City. The Long Bridge, over the Patapaco river, at Baltimore, is blocked up with the debris of the flood, in the shape of factory fixtures and house furniture, and two hundred bales of cotton have been saved from

The New Election Law.—The State Gazette gives in a nut shell the points of the new order of things: "Besides repealing the Registry and Sunset laws, acts were enacted that the polls should open at 7 A. M and remain open until 7 P. M., that Inspectors of Election and Registry, elected under the Registry law, should act as Judges of Elections this year; that Mayors and Common Councils in cities, or township committees, where there are more than 800 voters, must set off, on or before August 1st, election districts, so as not to contain more than 800 voters each, and file a description of the boundaries thereof—one copy in the County Clerk's office, and one in the City of Township Clerk's office; that in electing three judges, each ballot shall contain but three names, and the highest ihree shall be elected; and that voters in such districts must give their names, number and place of residence, which shall be entered on the poil book. These latter provisions are similar to those in the Registry law, except that no preliminary registry is required? in the Registry law, except that no preliminary istry is required."

_____ TRANSPORTING MENT.—A refrigerator car arrived in New York on Wednesday last, from Danville, ill., with 20,000 pounds of mutton and poultry, killed on the previous week and at once placed in the car.—The cars have double sides, of three-quarter inch pine plank, three inches apart. In the intervening space, three-inch elabs of cork are inserted, cork being considered the best non conductor of heat.—On the top of the car is a flutter wheel of zinc, working horizontally by the current of air created during On the top of the car is a nutter wheel of zinc, working horizontally by the current of air created during the motion of the train. On the same spindle with this wheel is a revolving fan, which throws the air, through flues, the entire length of the car to the ice chambers at each end. It is here cooled and concessed, and falls through other flues to the floor, passing under the hanging meat, and enveloping it as it rises to the ceiling. The temperature maintained is forty-two degrees.
