THE FUTURE OF NEW JERSEY.

A glorious future is in reserve for New Jersey. There is not a shadow of doubt about it. We are justified in arriving at this conclusion by judging from the natural course of events. New York, Brooklyn, Jersey City and Philadelphia, are destined, eventually, to be the great commercial emprisms of this part of North America; and New Jersey is to be the pleasure grounds of the citizens. The day is fast approaching, when this State will be covered with a gridiron of railroad tracks, only a short distance apart. The railroad enterprise of America is only in its infancy: The next decade or two of years, will unfold such developments in railroad; as will surprise us, quite as much as what his already been accomplished. On some of our roads, trains are run at over sixty miles per hour, with perfect safety. Confiding in the improvements that will doubtless be made in the construction of railroads, we may confidently rely on the calculation, that after a few years more, people may take the cars at New York, after their daily task is done, and in one hour—in less time than is now required to reach their sleeping places in Brooklyn—arriving at their beautiful country villas, sixty or seventy miles distant, where their families dwell, surrounded by all the beauties and luxuries of a delightful country. Riving in the cars will require but little time, and will cost but little money. Industrious laborers can leave their families at six in the morning, sixty miles from their business, and at seven be at their posts; at a cost of not more than ten cents.

Railroading will be brought to such perfection, that every freight train that transports a load of fruit and vegetables to market, will return heavily laden with fertilizing material to produce another crop—There are hurried into the New York market, sometimes, for each weekly supply, 8,000 beeves, 40,000 sheep, 55,000 swine, 3,000 veal calves, and poultry without weight, which furnish an immense amount of garbage and manurial material, that should




