Opening address delivered by Rev. A. E. Ballard, President of the Cumberland County Sabbath School Convention in the Baptist Church, at Cedarville, September 23d, 1868. One grand distinction between uncul-

tivated savage nations, and those who have become civilized by the labor of Christianity, is found in the different value they place upon their children .-The one has no clear conception of their inner spiritual nature, no conception at all of their immortality, and consequently no action corresponding with such ideas while the other understands the child's nward nature to be capable of appreciating God, and also to be stamped with power of existence, which no changes of life or death are competent to efface, and to some extent bases its idea of the child's value upon these great facts .--Savage nations do not hesitate at their destruction when their presence impedes gratification, and the average number that are thus destroyed in the single city of Pekin, is officially recorded as twentyfour each day. Christian communities recognizing in them a soul which can connect with the highest possibilities of being, have always held the life and care

of childhood as superior in importance to

that of the adult. The Bible, while evincing interest in every phase of human age and character, evinces special interest in children The Patriarchs were counted worthy of more honor, if their households were filled with children, and their proper training was as the proper basis for action toward it. signalized by the Creator as an act of was dishonored if no children blessed the family, and a numerous progeny was more esteemed than riches. Christianity has no page on which the blessing of children is not written, and the experiences of humanity when connected with childhood's possibilities, under the revela-tions of God, have ever been that life knows no blessing so rich as is found in the enjoyment of our children. They are to us the culminating gift in all the providence of life. They come to moisten human eyes, to soften human hearts, and deepen human love. They are unconscious moralists who hold back a father's from wickedness. The distant patter of roseate features alone hints to us the pearly freshness of Eve and Adam, when they bathed their faces in the morning dews of Paradise. 
