It is amusing the November results shall be announced. to note the humors of the political populace in connexion with these telegrams in our large cities, in front of a first-class Republican newspaper office, as they are printed upon large transparencies, and lighted up for the gaze and enlightenment of a confiding public. The figures cost little, and are never set down at less than thousands. An eager partisan will back up to a transparency, and read that Indiana has gone Republican by 5,000 majority. Indiana was esteemed by him to be Republicanally doubtful, and he shouts for joy. Other members of the party come up and are made happy in the same manner, and the whole concave roar themselves hoarse with the Chinese idea that the roaring strikes terror into the ranks of their enemies, and impromptu procession is generally formed, which wends its way toward the dwelling of some favorite member of the party, cheering all the way there, and then cheering again till they can cheer no longer, and go back to read fres telegrams of freshly triumphant victories .-At the same time in front of a prominent Democratic newspaper office, the same scenes will be enacting. Indiana will blaze and burn upon their transparencies with 4,000 majority for the Democrats. Indiana had been considered by them to be more than doubtful, and the result produces a corresponding elevation of feeling, which generally devolops in about the same manner as that indicated in the case of their opponents. There is a probable reason for suggesting the false returns, which may be found in the encouragement to the party elsewhere to work with greater energy, drawn from the wellknown principle that a man will work far more desperately for success if he thinks he is near it, than he will if he esteems it problematical, just as a man in the water will make desperate efforts to gain the shore if but a few yards from it, when the same man would give up quietly to drown if he was in the middle of the river. For a little time, often this system of false returns bears its way moderately successful in this direction, but in the nature of the case, often people learned their unreliability. This success could not continue, because the workers generally knew that they were as likely to be spurious as genuine, and therefore no inspiration came from them as additional incentive to labor. The strongest reason for producing these bogus dispatches is no doubt the gambling one. They profess to be able to prove that the fraude were so numerous on the other sider as to leave them a clear majority of the legal rotes' Whether they will be able to show this, can of course only be determined by the results, but still it is certain that our naturalization laws need large revision, for as they stand, the temptation to fraud by naorin cipled men is simost irrepressible, from the simple fact that they can be practiced with the negrest possible approach to impunity. A registration law which will prevent the infamous colonizing at present so much in vogue is also fully needed. If we would preserve in the public mind any of the sacredness. with which we have formerly invested the right of suffrage, and save it from public contempt, we must have a very much better class of laws to meet these evils than we at present prosess.




