The public eye begins to look forward quite anxiously for the coming reports from the various departments at Washington. These annual reports, it is asserted, will contain more than their usual interest, because they will discuss more fully the condition of the country's affairs. The Postmaster-General's report will exhibit the status of affairs in that department. His estimate of the ordinary expenses of the department, including the service of the mails for 1870, is set down at \$24,540,413. In this estimate he does not include the expenses for special service to China, Japan, Brazil, and the Sandwich Islands, which will require an additional sum of \$725,000.-During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1868, the entire income of the Post-Office Department, derived from the sale of stamps and postage collected, &c., was \$16,292,600. Last year the revenue partment must have been considerably augmented in proportion to the receipts, in fact, so great that they have absorbed not only the revenue, but also all the appropriations and funds standing to its credit, so that the Departments has nothing to fall back upon, except the current expenses of the coming year. This is a startling statement, but, in order to provide for deficiencies, Mr. Randall will ask for an appropriation of \$4,-

The Postmaster General speaks of the Overland Mail service as a very expensive enterprise, which has tended greatly to increase the deficiency alluded to above. New mail routes, established in July last, have also helped to enhance the deficiency. By his line of argument and figures, it is evident that the ordinary recripts will not meet the expenditures, and will be, in future, inadequate to support the service. The report will allude in detail, and show that the maintenance of postal service on expensive and territories, has cost a very large

The number of Post Offices in operation in the United States and Terri tories during the fiscal year is 26,481.— The number of changes of Postmasters during the year, 7,591; stamps and stamped envelopes sold during the year, 14,066,139; stamps and stamped envelopes issued to Postmasters during the year, 13,863,124. Number of mail letters delivered by carriers, 64,249,486; local letters delivered, 14,081,906; newspapers

delivered, 16,910,715. During the past year, the expenses for carrying on the mail service in eleven of the States recently in rebellion, has been for 1868, \$1,086,527; for 1867, \$1,891, 531; for 1866, \$2,168,459. The service to Montana Territory for 1868, amounted to \$33,650, making the entire cost of the service \$2,202,109. 
