Austria has since the dismemberment of her territory, adopted more liberal forms of political administration, even while clinging to the old despotism Hurgary, which was apparently dashed to hopeless slavery, under that they should be unflinchingly executed, if Austria's iron rule, has, by the necessities of that haughty power, been permitted a share in the Hapsburg nationality, and bids fair to be yet the ruling element among that people .-The Crctans, have, through almost unparalelled sufferings, achieved some substantial advancements in the pathways toward universal freedom. CRETE AND THE CRETANS.

The lecture of General Stewart F. The Woman Suffrage Association. Second Annual Meeting at Vineland.

The Second Annual Convention of the New Jersey Woman Suffrage Association was held at Vineland, on the 2d instant, some 150 Indies being present.—The proceedings were opened with prayer after which Lucy Stone, the President, addressed the Convention. She spoke at some length of facts showing the progress of the woman suffrage movement, and predicted that the time was not far distant when women would be granted the right of the ballot. Various commutees, were appointed, and the Treasurer reported receipts for the past year, \$208.62, and expenditures \$107.62. Officers were elected for the casuing year.

Resolutions were reported and adopted, after discussion, as follows: Resolutions were reported and adopted, and sussion, as follows:

RESOLVED. That governments are just only when they rest upon the consent of the governed, and that no government is truly representative or republican in term, so long as one half of the people are defined the exercise of their inherent right of sufrage on secount of sex.

the exercise of their inherent right of surrage on account of sex.

RESOUTED, That we demand the ballot for the 134,000 women of New Jesey, not as a privilege but as a right, and we earnestly recommend to all the friends of the cause to discriminate carefully, in casting their votes, between its friends and its opponents, and so to use the balance of power as to make the cufranchisement of women the direct path to political preferment.

autranchisement of women the direct path to political preferment.

Whereas, The old constitution of New Jersey, adopted in 1776, and in force until 1841, conferred suffrage on equal terms upon both sexes; and winercas the laws regulating elections prior to 1807 recognized and stirmed the woman's right by using the words "he or sho" and "his or her ballot;" and whereas women did in fact exercise that right until prohibited from so doing in 1807 by an Act of the Legislature; and whereas women were excluded from the election of the delegates who framed our present constitution, and from voting for or against the ratification of the same; and whereas the present constitution does not expressly exclude women from voting; therefore, Resolved, That the women of New Jersey are legally entitled to vote.

Resolved, That the officers of the New Jersey State Woman's Suffrage Association are hereby instructed to submit to the Legislature of New Jersey a memorial on behalf of this Convention setting forth the claims of the women of the State to suffrage and asking for the passage of a law affirming the existence of the right and making provision for its exercise; also that the Legislature he requested to amend Article lst, Section 2d of the Constitution, by striking out the word "male."




